



BG Named One of 50 Best Places to Live and Play

National Geographic Adventure Magazine has named Bowling Green one of the 50 Best Places to Live and Play in the

United States. The September 2007 issue includes Bowling Green as one of eleven cities in the "Top Small Town" category. Bowling Green was the only Kentucky city to make the Top 50 list compiled by contributing editor Dan Koeppel, who spent months tracking down and compiling the list of top adventure towns.

In determining the top cities, Koeppel sought "an ideal mix of terrain, activity, and opportunity (that) could inspire a complete and total life change." The magazine's first ever guide divided cities into the best mountain, urban, coastal, wilderness, and small town categories. Las Vegas was named the overall #1 U. S. Adventure Town.

Bowling Green (population of 52,272 / median home price of \$104,200) was recognized for its proximity to Nashville (which made the top urban city list), Louisville and Mammoth Cave; the hilly terrain; pick-it-yourself farms; the restored L&N Depot; local parks and road-bike loops; and the National Corvette Museum and GM Corvette plant (a source of town pride).

Car And Driver Names Saturn Astra One Of Top 10 Safe Vehicles For Under \$25,000...

Car and Driver's website has selected its Top 10 Safe Vehicles for Under \$25,000 and the upcoming Saturn Astra is on the list.



Even though the Astra won't be on sale in this country until later this year, Car and Driver based its ruling on testing already done on the Opel Astra by the European safety regulators.

The writers were impressed by the safety technology in the Saturn Astra. CarandDriver.com said, "The stability control system even features 'Understeer Control Logic,' which knows to increase brake pressure on the inner rear wheel. Neat."

GM Quality Leader Says Consumer Perceptions Are Catching Up With Reality...

The 2007 American Customer Satisfaction Index results announced by the University of Michigan recently



showed consumers are seeing the benefits of GM's work to improve product quality and service. According to GM Vice President of Quality Jamie Hresko, this is confirmation the company is moving in the right direction.

"The gap is narrowing," said Hresko. "Great product designs combined with consistent quality performance year-toyear, study-to-study is what we need to change customer perception."

The index, produced by the University of Michigan's Ross School of Business in partnership with the American Society for Quality (ASQ), showed Buick and Cadillac rising to the top of the class. The study, which asks car owners to rate their overall vehicle satisfaction on a 100-point scale, showed Cadillac and Buick both scoring 86 - just one point below Lexus (87). According to the index, all GM brands improved year-to-year except GMC, which was unchanged. Saab and HUMMER were not included in the study.

Asian makes, Toyota, Honda and Nissan, deteriorated year-to-year. Overall customer satisfaction with automobiles in general improved 1.2 % to a new high of 82%. The gains within the industry were attributed to quality improvements versus price incentives.

August Sales On the Rise

GM dealers in the U.S. delivered 388,168 vehicles in August, up more than 5 percent compared with year-ago monthly sales. This was a strong performance that resulted in an anticipated highest-of-the-year market share of nearly 26 percent. Brisk sales of full-size pickups and crossovers led the increase.

"Bucking the trend in the industry, we were able to post healthy sales results in August. When combining retail sales with our growing commercial business, our sales were up when compared with last August. Importantly, last month was our third-best retail month of the year," said Mark LaNeve, GMNA vice president, Vehicle Sales, Service and Marketing. "With the double-digit decline in daily rental sales so far this year, and an overall market that remains challenging and competitive, we continue to stabilize our retail share and pricing in the market."

Overall incentive spending was flat compared with a year ago. August inventories were down about 34,000 vehicles to approximately 945,000 vehicles.

The GMC Acadia, Saturn OUTLOOK and Buick Enclave together had retail sales of more than 10,400 vehicles, pushing the significant retail increase in GM's mid-crossover segment.
